



## TIDELAND AIDS TO NAVIGATION FOR SENTOSA ISLAND

Tideland Signal Pte Ltd, a subsidiary of Tideland Signal Corporation, is proud to announce their contribution to the effort of the Singapore Government to transform Sentosa Island into a world class resort, with the installation of Tideland's self-contained, solar-powered lanterns to guide mariners into the entrance of ONE°15 Marina at Sentosa Cove.



The two Tideland SolaMax-155 lanterns have been installed complete with concrete structures to mark the entrance of ONE°15 Marina, just off the coast of Singapore. SolaMAX-155, which is featured on this project in red and green, is a self-contained lantern with six integral solar panels, and is fitted with MaxiHALO-60 LED flasher controller, which features 256 user-selectable flash codes. The lanterns also feature Tideland's latest long life 36Ah Lithium Ion Phosphate battery. All the internals, including the long-life LEDs and high-integrity electronics are contained within a tough

UV-resistant polycarbonate enclosure, which only needs to be opened after five years operation, when a battery change is recommended.

Sentosa Island was once a fishing village known as Pulau Blakang Mati. It later became a British military fortress until 1967 when it was handed back to the newly independent Singapore Government. In 1968, the Government decided to develop the island into a holiday resort for local visitors and tourists. The public was invited to suggest names for the island and "Sentosa" – meaning peace & tranquility in Malay - was eventually chosen for the island resort.
